Read the lyrics to the following song:

*When I was just a little girl, I asked my mother, what will I be.  
Will I be pretty, will I be rich, here's what she said to me.*

*Qué Sera, Sera, whatever will be, will be.  
The future's not ours, to see.  
Qué Sera, Sera. What will be, will be.*

*When I was young, I fell in love, I asked my sweetheart what lies ahead.  
Will we have rainbows, day after day, here's what my sweetheart said.*

*Qué Sera, Sera, whatever will be, will be.  
The future's not ours, to see.  
Qué Sera, Sera. What will be, will be.*

*Now I have children of my own, they ask their mother, what will I be.  
Will I be handsome, will I be rich, I tell them tenderly.*

*Qué Sera, Sera, whatever will be, will be.  
The future's not ours, to see.  
Qué Sera, Sera. What will be, will be.*

Do you recognize them? These are the words to the song made famous by Doris Day. They have always felt a little bit too fatalistic for me. It is true that our physical looks or wealth may or may not be in our hands. However, some things are in our own hands and the song makes no mention of those things.

Throughout Jewish history, our people have given us examples of people who have made things happen for the best. There is the example of Noah preparing for the flood by building an ark. In addition, there were the Maccabees who stood up for the Jewish people to take back the Temple.

Another example comes from the Megillah and the story of Purim. On February 28<sup>th</sup> we will be celebrating the holiday of Purim and we will read from the Megillah. There is a scene in chapter 4 when Mordechai discovers that the king has signed a decree that all of the Jews are to be wiped

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out on a certain day in the month of Adar. Mordechai goes to the palace gates, wearing sackcloth and ashes, and he asks the guards to bring a message to Queen Esther, and to tell her that he must speak to her right away.

When Esther comes out to him, her first reaction is one of embarrassment. She does not want to be identified with him now that she is a Queen. She sends for proper clothing for him to wear so that he will take off the sackcloth and the ashes, but Mordechai refuses to do so.

Esther also knows that no one is permitted an audience with the King without be summoned by him. Anyone who attempts to do so, without the King's permission, will be put to death. Esther has not been summoned to visit the king. Nevertheless, Mordechai is eventually successful in getting Esther to advocate for the Jewish people. She agrees to go before the king, but asks that the

community prays for her. Esther says, “*v’ka-asher avadti, avadti – and if I perish, then I will perish.*”

What Esther is saying is that she is ready to take action. She will confront the king and do what she can do to persuade him to annul the decree of wiping out all of the Jews. And if she fails, she fails. But at least she will have given it her best shot and has done whatever she could to change the situation.

In life we are often confronted with this challenge. If we choose “what will be, will be,” then we surrender responsibility for what happens. If we choose the way of Queen Esther, we will do whatever we can to change our circumstances. Living with the sentiment of the Doris Day song is tempting because it minimizes failure, by never trying. If you follow the advice of Esther, you may fail, but at least you will know that you have attempted the effort.

There is a lot of noise during Purim. The congregation goes wild when they hear the name of you-know-who. But when we get to those 3 words of Esther, “*v’ka-asher avadti, avadti*, we should pay close attention. These are wise words to live by. Words that proclaim that I will do my best, and then, and only then, after I have offered my very best, will I say “what will be, will be.”

I wanted to take this time to provide an update on what is happening in our schools. As you might know, this year we implemented several new programs in both schools.

In the preschool, our theme has been an awareness and importance of the power of play. Instead of teacher-directed learning, we are taking our cues from children and their interests. This is called Emergent Curriculum. When implementing Emergent Curriculum, documentation is the key. Teachers observe, take notes and pictures, and create portfolios for every child demonstrating their strengths and abilities. Kol Emet Preschool’s vision is to be an active and vibrant learning community teaching relevant and quality values, as well as Pennsylvania Early Learning Standards. This is why we were able to qualify for state grants to improve our facility and provide continued education for our staff. It has always been our mission to provide the safest, warmest, and supportive environment for children and their parents. Currently, open registration for the community has begun. In the past, most of our classes filled instantly. We will have space in our 2-year-old classes (either M/W/F or T/Th) and our Kindergarten Enrichment class (M/W/F, 12pm-3pm, after their morning

classes in public school). Please share this information with your friends and neighbors . . . you are our best advertisement.

Now for a religious school update. With the addition of the Wednesday schedule, lots of quality learning has been created. The addition of Rosh Chodesh education has been fantastic; students are participating and being exposed to prayer service, spirituality, and connecting with G-d. The blending of Confirmation and 7<sup>th</sup> grade has created a social experience for all grades. The school has a more even division and there is less crowding, as well as lots of learning. We have had terrific participation in our family education programs. Services have been superbly attended and Sunday programs have been busy and fun.

In March, we have two fabulous Passover programs: on March 7<sup>th</sup>, we have a bus trip planned to visit Lakewood NJ. I promise that you will never look at matzah in the same way after you visit the Lakewood Matzah Factory. We will also go shopping at Judaica Plaza where you can find anything from Kosher for Passover lipstick to ten varieties of horseradish. The music, book, and Judaica selection is comparable to a shop in Israel.

And speaking of Israel (and you know I always do), the response to our last 2 Israel planning meetings have been unbelievable. By the time you read this article, we will have registration in place. There will be only 40 spaces on our trip, due to space restrictions on our bus. Kol Emet members will have the first opportunity to register. The Israel trip will last for 10 days. We plan to leave December 22<sup>nd</sup> and return on January 2<sup>nd</sup>. Stay tuned for more exciting details as this will be a trip of a lifetime!

As you know, it has been my personal mission to provide creative and enticing programs for our Kol Emet community. With the tremendous help of the Preschool and the Religious School PTOs, we are able to plan and share learning experiences. They have been a constant support and positive energy behind all of the amenities we provide for your children. Please be sure to reciprocate by participating in the Purim program and the Kol Emet Loves Disco programs. Both will be spectacular fundraisers as well as an opportunity to support your Kol Emet family.
