L'Dor V'Dor – From generation to generation

At the end of the month of January, we will read the Torah portion from the Book of Exodus called Bo. In the parsha, we learn how the Pharaoh was on the ropes after he and his people had lived through seven plagues. He is ready to make concessions to Moses. The Pharaoh says, "Okay, I will let some of you go to worship to G-d. But tell me, *mi vami hacholchim* – which ones will be going? How many people do you need for the service and which ones are you going to take?" Moses answered, "*Binvreynu uvizkuneynu neylach* – we are going to go with our young and with our old, together to serve our G-d."

I love this line because I believe that it expresses a central Jewish truth, which is that we build our community and live in the spirit of G-d with ALL of our generations together. We refuse to choose one over the other!

Recently a group of our leaders from Kol Emet joined with others committed to maintaining and growing synagogue communities. We heard from senior adults, baby boomers, GenX'ers, and millennials. Representatives from four generations spoke to the themes of community, meaningful Jewish experiences, and the value of synagogue membership. I also heard about feeling unappreciated for one reason or another by leadership.

Our synagogue belongs equally to all of us. And only if we understand this truth will there be a synagogue. For if, G-d forbid, one group, one generation, says to another that it is our Shul, what do we need them for ...

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there will be no synagogue, and there will be no moral right to have a synagogue.

One of the messages I came away with from that night among the synagogue leaders is that each generation has talents, knowledge, and experiences that deserve our respect and attention. With the zest, curiosity, eagerness, and idealism of the younger generations combined with the realism, maturity, and balance of age, we will go forward to serve G-d with **all** of our might, **all** of our spirit, and with **all** of our heart!

As we welcome the new year of 2012, I have a hope for all of Kol Emet and our community:

*May we be young enough to believe in people
And may we be old enough not to expect from them
more than they are able to give
May we be young enough to be open to new ideas
And may we be young enough to strive for power,
prosperity, and success
And may we be old enough to understand what power,
prosperity, and material success cannot buy
And may we be young enough to value companionship
And may we be old enough to appreciate solitude and
privacy as well*

May each generation realize how much we need each other. We need to meet the future with our young and with our old together.

Every year our preschool staff and lay leaders contemplate the importance of participating in the Keystone STARS program. This program began 11 years ago with the purpose of raising the standards in early childhood programs throughout Pennsylvania. The state gives grant money and education retention bonuses to centers that participate. The process is rigorous and highly time consuming. The bonuses and grant money are lovely, but the real gifts the Keystone STARS program provides is high quality standards to staff, parents, and most important, our children.

Every classroom is inspected by the state and graded on space and furnishings environment, personal care routines/health and hygiene, language reasoning and communications, activities such as art, music, fine motor, interaction between parents, staff, and children, program structure and balance, as well as parents and staff relationships.

If you ask our staff what they have gained from this program, it would be the quality education and professional growth opportunities. These events give

our staff the high standards they hand down to our children. Most schools like ours receive STARS money because they provide inclusion services for children with special needs. We admire the specialists from the Intermediate Unit as they provide us with guidance, patience, and direction. We also sincerely adore and love watching all of our students grow and develop in a warm, loving environment.

So what has STARS paid for through the years? Our shed, our fence, and playground equipment. STARS money has been used to enclose our bicycle area, re-mulch our playground every year and has paid for safety mirrors and the window blinds in every room. STARS money has been used to buy new furniture, chairs, and new carpets. The staff has received STARS money to continue their educational pursuits as well. Many of our staff have taken college level courses and have received Early Childhood Certificates because of STARS money.

Currently, Kol Emet Preschool holds a 3 STAR ranking. We have the highest STAR ranking for a synagogue preschool in all of Pennsylvania. I share this fact with you because it truly takes a community to participate in Keystone STARS. It takes staff members like ours to realize the quality care and high standards it provides to children. It takes a very well organized person like Marla to keep documentation of all the requirements. And it takes lay leaders and parents to appreciate the dedication, importance, and quality standards this program provides for our children.

So as we prepare for another inspection in March 2012, and then again, in April 2012, I would like to publically thank our amazing staff members for supporting our Keystone STARS pursuits. I encourage our congregation to do the same by thanking our staff members for all of their hard work, and to appreciate the amazing environment they have created.

What does this T.S. Eliot poem have to do with Kol Emet and how will Kol Emet grow and change into the 21st century?

My goal upon becoming president of Kol Emet was to reevaluate who we are as a sacred community. We have come a long way since the beginnings of Kol Emet 28 or so years ago. My mantra these past several months has been, "Judaism is changing and so must we". Lucky for me the Jewish world has been thinking the very same thing. The daunting task of change is how to go about it. My search led me to discussing this process with a friend who is a past synagogue president (of another congregation) as well as President and CEO of a nonprofit organization. He sent me a fabulous article titled, "Building Your Companies Vision", by James Collins and Jerry Porras. Although the article is about companies, the issues we share related to articulating and fulfilling mission, vision and long range planning are remarkably the same. The poem quoted above and the ideas I will discuss in this message are from this article. Kol Emet, like many organizations, has a mission and a vision statement. It was developed before I was a member and although it is read at congregational meetings and board meetings when was the last time we REALLY evaluated if we are living our own mission and vision?

Our Mission

Kol Emet is a Reconstructionist Jewish Congregation that strives to encourage spiritual fulfillment, happiness and meaning for its members and their families through interactive worship, life-long education and service to our community and the larger world.

Our Vision

Kol Emet will continue to be an inclusive, caring Jewish congregation whose members seek to evolve spiritually and educationally.

Kol Emet will strive to engage its members, create connections, and enrich their lives.

Kol Emet will be an intimate, enduring, and dynamic home for all generations.

This is Kol Emet's Mission and Vision statement directly from our website. This is what our founders felt was the core purpose of Kol Emet. According to Collins and Porras, the core purpose/mission is the organization's reason for being. It answers the important question "why are we here?". Organizations/synagogues are formed when a group of people get together so they can accomplish something together that they could not accomplish separately, make a contribution to society. Our purpose is a guide that is always sought after, but

never achieved. Organizations, like people, are always a work in progress. The primary role of this core purpose, according to the writers, is to guide and inspire us.

While our core purpose does not change, it inspires change. Because we never achieve our purpose, we must always search for new, creative and meaningful ways to stimulate change and progress. What is more important than having a vision statement is to BE visionary. The authors call this an envisioned future. The vision statement provides the framework, but an envisioned future requires action. Having an envisioned future means setting ambitious goals that excite everyone and having a vivid enough picture of what it will look like to achieve those goals so they are vibrant, engaging, and most importantly tangible.

As Judaism and the generations that call Kol Emet home change, engaging you in creating the vision of our future is how Kol Emet will be successful in the 21st century. Jewish Learning Venture presents jkidphilly programs

Jkidphilly is a program of Jewish Learning Venture and provides a number of programs and resources to support Jewish families with children. It is both a website and a web of activities and opportunities for families with children ages birth to twelve.

Even before children are born, the **New Beginnings** program reaches out to expectant parents with resources and opportunities to promote early connections to Jewish community and Jewish learning. In a **New Beginnings** class, expectant parents will learn about raising a Jewish child, Jewish rituals for newborns (like brit and Simchat bat), Jewish thoughts on baby

naming, the vocabulary of Jewish living, and making Jewish choices for one's child that are comfortable for the family. For more information, contact Debbie Leon at dleon@jewishlearningventure.org, 215-320-0405.

One of our most well known programs is the **PJ Library of Greater Philadelphia**. **PJ Library** supports families in their Jewish journey by sending Jewish-content books and music on a monthly basis to children from age six months to five and a half (5 1/2) years living in the Greater Philadelphia area (Bucks, Chester, Delaware, Montgomery and Philadelphia counties). **This is a free program**. Another popular program is **Our Jewish Home**. **Our Jewish Home** (OJH) is an in-home Jewish education program designed to build Jewish identity at the kitchen-table level, training parents to be teachers and empowering them to take on the Jewish education of their children. For the many Jewish parents who did not get a thorough foundation in Judaism themselves, for those who may have been disconnected from the community for a period of time, for those who may be new to Judaism, or for those looking to enhance their own knowledge, the **OJH** program can lay the groundwork. Jkidphilly also presents free **Making Connections** public space holiday programs, appropriate for ages up to six and open to every family. Alyssa raised money for her cousin Kim, who has cholangia carcinoma, a rare cancer of the bile duct. Alyssa had a table in front of Villa Rosa and Red Berry and sold "Hope 4 Kim" bracelets. All the proceeds went to help her family.

Kim's story of her battle, and the support from her family and community is inspirational. She was on the news and interviewed by Stephanie Stahl as part of a Channel 3 program to draw attention to Kim's plight for insurance coverage that was initially denied. She had this amazing surgery at Columbia-Presbyterian in NYC in which Dr. Kato, a wonderful surgeon who specializes in multiple organ transplants, took a vein out of her neck so she could be the donor and recipient to herself. They replaced the diseased portal vein of her liver with her own vein. Then they took her liver out of her body for eight hours, reattached it to the new vein and put it back in her body. The recovery was very long, but the surgery bought her some time with her two children and her ailing mother. Unfortunately she was only cancer-free for one year and she is still fighting the fight. She hosts a radio show on WWDB called "Living with Cancer" on Mondays and is quite a strong and inspirational woman.



Here is Kim's Facebook message: Life is short...I smile and laugh every day. I'm on a journey that won't stop until I get to where I need to go. Keeping the focus, looking ahead, and enjoying the sights along the way.

I have two daughters, Gabrielle and Gianna. While in nursing school, I diagnosed myself with a rare type of cancer. Through miraculous events, a strong will and much determination, I have accomplished what many surgeons thought was impossible. My tumor was removed by the very brilliant and courageous, Dr. Tomoaki Kato. I am a walking miracle and strive every day to be an inspiration to others. Nothing is impossible & persistence is the key to success...no matter what that success may be.
