## ***“Am I in the Place of G-d?”***

One of the most painful emotional outbursts in our Torah is expressed by the matriarch, Rachel. She has seen her sister Leah, the rival for the love of their husband Jacob, give birth to four sons in rapid succession, while she herself remained childless. Out of envy and rage, Rachel cries out to Jacob “Give me children or I will die!” Jacob responds in sadness, tinged with a little anger “Am I in the place of G-d who has denied you a child?”

This is an important question that each of us might ask ourselves from time to time because we succumb to the temptation to play G-d. So often we sit in judgment on other human beings about whom we have only the most superficial knowledge, and about whose circumstances we often know nothing at all. Our Rabbis warned us not to judge another person until we find ourselves in that person’s situation, until we can understand his fears and frustrations, his hopes and his hungers. Before we rush to judgment, a good question to slow us down would be “Am I in the place of G-d?”

Jacob’s question is also good for our sanity. When we recognize our limitations, we stop demanding perfection of ourselves. We are not 100% parents, we are not 100% mates, and we are not 100% children. We should stop tormenting ourselves for falling short of perfection in one or all of our different roles in which we are involved. Often we have to make difficult choices between our spouses and our parents, our parents and our children, and we cannot possibly satisfy them all.

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Ralph Waldo Emerson said that there is a crack in everything G-d has made. Perfection is beyond human reach. Jacob captured this truth in his question, “Am I in the place of G-d?”

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By the time you read this article, the Jewish holidays, which usurped the month of October, will be long gone.

Yet the memories we create around each holiday will hopefully be imprinted in our children's souls.

I often admire how brilliant our ancient Rabbis were when it came to using creative and meaningful experiential learning moments. Experiential learning has been a priority in our religious school for the past 2 years. Our staff has studied correct implementation and has created many successful programs based on learning through hands on experiences.

Think about our Jewish holidays – they encompass our senses with smells, sights, sounds, and rituals. These are all ways that we experience our holidays and our learning: from hearing the Shofar, eating apples & honey, throwing breadcrumbs in the river, building a Sukkah, shaking a Lulav, smelling an Etrog, and dancing with a Torah. Our multiple intelligences (Howard Gartner) are all being stimulated as our memory banks are loaded with positive and meaningful Jewish moments.

Our staff intends to continue this momentum by using experiential learning every week in the classroom. It is our goal to be sure that every precious moment is a meaningful and positive moment at school. Here are just a few examples of how our staff uses experiential learning in our classrooms:

- In the Kadima class, art is used to create Shabbat boxes, which are used at home.
- Mechina loves to bake Hamantaschen every year.
- Aleph classes create posters of personal Jewish heroes and learn Hebrew letters through body movements and games.
- In Bet, students act out the Torah stories with props.
- Gimel is busy learning Hebrew language through tasting foods as they learn how to pronounce each one in Hebrew.
- Daled is often found in the sanctuary opening the Torah and rehearsing B'nai Mitzvah rituals.
- Hey class reenacts Jewish life cycle events as well as hosting guest speakers and going on field trips.

It is our goal not to exclusively rely on our books, but instead to make every class a positive, experiential step forward.

It is for this reason (and many more) that consistent attendance in religious school is so important. As I often tell you, please don't wait to talk to me if something doesn't feel right in religious school. This works the other way as well. Your children need to attend regularly because reviewing books cannot replace the actual experience.

As a child goes through our school they are creating their own personal community. A community of friends that they share experiences with and a community of children whose parents have the same values when it comes to educating their children, and their moral and ethical values. I often say that religious school is 90% social. We want your children to enjoy coming here, whether it is to see their friends, eat a "Rosh Chodesh" cookie, listen to stories, or appreciate their Jewish community.

In conclusion, I am confident that our staff is committed to providing meaningful moments every week for your children. This will be an amazing school year!

### **President's Message**

After my Rosh Hashanah address to the congregation I was told that many could not hear me well and I know that some members of our community were not present. The words I spoke that day were very important to me and speak to what my goals are for Kol Emet in the years ahead. For those reasons, I would like to print my Rosh Hashanah message to the community. I know for you it is now November, but I am sending this to press (so to speak) on the day after Yom Kippur when the messages of the holidays are still in my heart and mind.

On behalf of the board of directors I want to wish each of you a sweet and blessed 5772. L'Shanah Tovah Tikatevu literally means "may you be inscribed in the book of life for a good year".

We say this all the time, but what does it really mean? Do we believe in a big book where G-d writes our names and seals our fate for the coming year?

I don't. To me, personally, it's about how I live my life and the choices I make. Will I allow the challenges,

disappointments, and difficult events to tear me down or will I be able to learn and grow from these experiences? Being inscribed for another year in the “book of life” is not about remaining alive but about BEING alive. And being alive is about the quality, meaning, and purpose of life.

I have always been in awe of people that can take a terrible hardship and do something good with it. We have many families in our community that have done just that. I have good friends in this community that are dealing with health and personal challenges every day, but they continue to give back to the community here and outside these walls. Living your life with thankfulness, vision, meaning, and purpose while dealing with the challenges of life is what being inscribed in the book of life means to me.

So what lesson does Rosh Hashanah have for Kol Emet? We have had our challenges over the years. All religious institutions are struggling with attracting, retaining, and engaging their members, but these hurdles can create opportunities for growth. We can learn from our challenges and use them to grow and evolve as a Kehillah Kedosha (a sacred community). I have thought a great deal about Kol Emet in the last few years. What I learned is that I am passionate about Judaism and I am passionate about Kol Emet. We are still here and we are doing OK, but I want us to be great!!

Over the last several months, I have read many articles on how 21st century synagogues are meeting the changing needs of their congregants. The prevailing opinion is that changes need to be made. Our community is the spiritual home to several generations, all of whom are in different stages of their lives, and connect with the world and Judaism in different ways.

The world is constantly changing, and as Reconstructionists, it is our philosophy to change with it. We must constantly evaluate ourselves so we keep up with the changing needs of those in our community. What people in their 60's and 70's and baby boomers are looking for is different from what people in their 30's and 40's are looking for, and who knows what our children will want when they grow up to be adult members of the Jewish community.

The members of Kol Emet did not build this home for just themselves, it was built in the hope that future generations would be part of this community, which we felt, was so special.

We must now begin the process of self-evaluation. Are we meeting your spiritual, intellectual, and communal needs? How can we do better? We will only be successful if our change reflects what you want. The direction of Kol Emet will be guided by you, our Kehillah Kedosha.

Do I have all the answers? No, but I do have many questions. That is what being Jewish is all about. The Long Range Planning committee will be developing a process that will engage you in guiding the future of Kol Emet. We will be asking you many questions, and to be successful we will need your input! We want to hear your ideas, goals, dreams, and desires for our community. You will be hearing more about this process in the months to come, and I look forward to discussing and planning with you.
